Findings from a review of research about the link between adult-onset hearing loss, dementia, and problems with thinking and memory, support the suggestion that adult-onset hearing loss might be a cause of dementia.

Adult-onset hearing loss can be treated, most often with hearing aids. The findings support suggestions that addressing hearing loss might reduce the risk of some types of dementia.

Culturally Adapted Therapy Improved Postnatal Depression in British South Asian Women

A study exploring culturally adapted therapy found that it helped British women from South Asian backgrounds (including Pakistani, Indian, Bangladeshi, and Sri Lankan) recover from postnatal depression more quickly than with standard care alone. Participants from Derby and Derbyshire were involved in the study.

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer in men, with more than 55,000 new cases each year in the UK. Treatment options for localised cancer are based on how likely the cancer is to spread beyond the prostate and include active surveillance, surgery or radiotherapy.
